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BLESSED ARE THE POOR IN SPIRIT**Bible Reading:** 1 Peter 5:5-9**VERSE TO MEMORIZE:**

"Blessed are the poor in spirit,
for theirs is the kingdom of
heaven. Matthew 5:3

Objective

Understand that demonstrating a
humble and sincere heart at all
times pleases our God.

COMMENT FOR INSTRUCTION

True blessing begins with a humble heart. To be poor in spirit means recognizing our need for God's help and guidance. Humility is not a weakness, but a correct attitude. God is pleased when the heart of man is not proud, but submits to his will.

The apostle Peter exhorts us to clothe ourselves with humility and to demonstrate this important virtue in our daily conduct. God opposes the proud, but gives grace to the humble. Pride exalts the heart, while humility disposes it to receive what God grants according to His purpose.

Humility is also shown by placing all our worries and our trust in our Father. No burden is too heavy for Him. Surrendering to God everything that causes us anxiety shows a heart that recognizes our dependence on and trust in Him.

The enemy will try at all costs to lead us astray from the right path. Therefore, we are urged to be vigilant and stand firm in the faith. A humble heart listens to the counsel and commandments conveyed in Scripture, heeds them, and obeys them. The humble person does not ignore danger but remains alert and steadfast.

Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. This teaching shows that God honors those who approach Him with a sincere and obedient heart. Humility pleases our Father and leads to a life that walks according to His will.

BLESSED ARE THOSE WHO MOURN**Bible Reading:** Psalm 35:10-14**VERSE TO MEMORIZE:**

"Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted"
Matthew 5:4

Objective:

Understanding that crying out of love for Christ or out of compassion for our brothers is not a cause for shame, but a blessing.

COMMENT FOR INSTRUCTION

Crying is not always a sign of weakness. Often it stems from pain, affliction, and even compassion. The Lord Jesus taught that those who mourn are blessed, for they will be comforted (Matthew 5:4). This reveals that God knows the pain of the heart and does not despise it.

In Psalm 35, King David expresses his sadness and affliction, but he also shows a heart sensitive to the suffering of others. Even when others rose up against him, his response was to humble himself and afflict himself with fasting (Psalm 35:11-13). This crying was not selfish, but a cry that showed compassion and fear of God.

Crying for the affliction of others is also an expression of love. David acted as if his pain were for a friend or a brother (Psalm 35:14). This shows that God is pleased when there is sensitivity to the suffering of others, and when the heart is not indifferent to the needs of our brothers and sisters.

Crying does not lead to despair, but to hope. God promises to comfort those who mourn and strengthen those who trust in Him (Psalm 34:19). Affliction is not the end, but a time when God works in our hearts to teach, correct, and comfort us.

Truly, comfort comes from above. This promise assures us that no cry is ignored when offered with a sincere heart, for the heavenly Father is close to the brokenhearted and saves the crushed in spirit (Psalm 34:18).

BLESSED ARE THE MEEK**Bible Reading:** 1 Peter 3:13-17**VERSE TO MEMORIZE:**

"Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth. Matthew 5:5

OBJECTIVE:

To learn that it is necessary to know how to conduct ourselves before God and men with all meekness and good works in order to attain the promise of eternal life.

COMMENT FOR INSTRUCTION

Meekness is a correct way to conduct oneself before God and before men. To be meek does not mean to be weak, but to act with understanding in one's heart and to do good even when others do not. Indeed, the meek are blessed and will receive an inheritance (Matthew 5:5).

The apostle Peter's letter shows that meekness is reflected in daily conduct. We must not return evil for evil, but rather act with a clear conscience, even when we suffer for doing what is right. Meekness leads to a life pleasing to God.

Good works must accompany meekness. It is not enough to speak correctly; it is necessary to act according to what God commands. At times, doing good may bring difficulty, but God sees and rewards obedience done with a sincere heart.

Material



Meekness helps us respond correctly in difficult times. We must always be prepared to respond with meekness and reverence when asked to give an account of the hope in our hearts. This teaches that meekness also guides our words and actions, as it did in the Lord Jesus, who was the example. His way of life pleased God. Meekness leads us on a path of obedience, good works, and hope, according to what God has promised in His Word.

BLESSED ARE THOSE WHO HUNGER AND THIRST**Bible Reading:** Psalm 42:1-2.

VERSE TO MEMORIZE:

"Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled." Matthew 5:6

OBJETIVE:

Let us strive to ensure that our thoughts and actions are directed towards fulfilling God's will and not focus on earthly things.

COMMENT FOR INSTRUCTION

There is a hunger and thirst that are not of the body, but of the heart. The Lord Jesus declared blessed those who hunger and thirst for righteousness and promised them that they would be filled (Matthew 5:6). This teaching shows that God knows the inner desire of those who seek to do what is right in His sight.

Concern for material things should not rule the heart. Nor should we worry about what we will eat or wear, because God knows every need (Matthew 6:31-32). The heart that seeks first the kingdom of God learns to trust in His care (Matthew 6:33).

To hunger and thirst for righteousness means to desire to live according to God's will. Man does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God (Deuteronomy 8:3). This inner desire directs our thoughts and actions toward what is right.

Material



Spiritual hunger leads to seeking God in prayer, obedience, and good works. God promises to be found by those who seek Him with all their heart (Jeremiah 29:13).

The Lord Jesus said that when we seek first the kingdom of heaven and His righteousness, all these things will be added to us (Matthew 6:33). God provides what is necessary for those who seek His will; therefore, hunger and thirst for righteousness lead to an ordered life (Matthew 6:33-34).

BLESSED ARE THE MERCIFUL

Bible Reading: Job 29:1-13

VERSE TO MEMORIZE:

"Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy." Matthew 5:7

OBJETIVE:

Recognize that it is important to empathize and be merciful to our neighbor in their needs, without seeking recognition or personal gain, because our God will be the one who gives us just recompense.

COMMENT FOR INSTRUCTION

Mercy is a quality that pleases God and should be reflected in how we treat others. The Lord Jesus declared the merciful blessed, showing that God sees and rewards His children who respond to the needs of their neighbors.

The book of Job describes a life characterized by mercy. Job recalled how he helped the poor, the orphan, and those who had no one to help them (Job 29:12-13). These actions were not done to seek honor, but as a response to the real needs of others. Mercy is demonstrated through actions, not just words.

Mercy springs from a sensitive heart. Job was eyes for the blind and feet for the lame. He showed care and compassion for those who could not care for themselves (Job 29:15). Mercy leads us to see the needs of others and act with justice and kindness.

Material



Mercy also involves acting without expecting human reward. God sees the deeds done in secret and gives just recompense (Proverbs 19:17). When mercy is practiced sincerely, God takes care of rewarding according to His will.

Mercy is part of a life that pleases God. Those who are merciful reflect an acceptable character. Living a life of mercy leads to a blessed life (Hosea 6:6). It is also important, as an act of mercy, to share the gospel with sinners (Matthew 9:9-13).

BLESSED ARE THE PURE IN HEART**Bible Reading:** Psalm 24:3-6.

VERSE TO MEMORIZE:

"Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God." Matthew 5:8

OBJECTIVE:

Reflecting on the fact that to be in the presence of our God it is very important that our heart be cleansed of evil.

COMMENT FOR INSTRUCTION

Being born into the church of God, or having come to know the gospel at a young age, is a great blessing, for studying the Bible leads us to discern between good and evil and to maintain a clean and pure heart. Not everyone can approach God in just any way. The psalmist asks who may ascend the mountain of the Lord and dwell in holiness. This teaches that God observes the heart and the way we live.

Psalm 24 declares that the one who has clean hands and a pure heart is the one who can stand before God. Cleanliness of heart refers not only to outward appearance, but also to what is within, since the heart must be set apart from wickedness and falsehood.

A clean heart receives God's blessing. Those who seek Him with sincerity and truth receive righteousness and favor from on high. This shows that God responds to those who approach Him with a pure heart.

Material



The Lord Jesus taught that the pure in heart are blessed because they will see God. This promise shows that God reveals Himself to those who live with a pure and obedient heart. Purity of heart allows for a right relationship with God.

The heart can be cleansed when sin is acknowledged and God's will is sought. Purity of heart is not just a teaching, but a call to live in holiness, turning away from evil and seeking what is good (Psalm 51:10).

BLESSED ARE THE PEACEMAKERS**Bible Reading:** Psalm 34:11-16**VERSE TO MEMORIZE:**

"Blessed are the peacemakers: for they shall be called sons of God."

Matthew 5:9

OBJECTIVE:

To imitate the peaceful conduct that the Lord Jesus demonstrated before men.

INSTRUCTIONAL COMMENTARY

Peace does not arise automatically, but must be sought and practiced. We must depart from evil and do good, seek peace and pursue it. This shows that peace is a way of conduct that pleases God and requires obedience and willingness of heart.

Psalm 34 teaches that God hears and cares for the righteous. His eyes are upon them and His ears hear their cry. This shows that God is pleased with those who live seeking peace and acting rightly before Him.

Being a peacemaker does not mean avoiding problems, but responding in the proper way. The tongue must be kept from evil and the lips from deceit. Peace is preserved with words, with actions, and with conduct that reflects obedience to God.

Peacemakers are blessed because they shall be called the children of God

(Matthew 5:9). Seeking peace and doing good reflects conduct that pleases God and identifies those who desire to live according to His will.

Doing good and seeking peace are part of daily life. Peaceful conduct does not seek conflict, but strives for obedience, respect, and the good of others, according to the example that the Lord Jesus left (1 Peter 2:21-23).

BLESSED ARE THOSE WHO SUFFER PERSECUTION**Bible Reading:** 2 Corinthians 11:25-33**VERSE TO MEMORIZE:**

"Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." Matthew 5:10

OBJECTIVE:

To understand that living according to the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ may bring us persecutions of different kinds.

INSTRUCTIONAL COMMENTARY

Living in obedience to the will of God can bring difficulties. Those who decided to serve faithfully faced suffering because of the gospel. The apostle Paul relates that he endured beatings, imprisonments, and dangers in different places while carrying out his ministry (2 Corinthians 11:25-27), which teaches that persecution is not something strange in the life of the child of God.

Persecution does not mean that God is far away. The righteous may go through many afflictions, but God remains attentive and near, caring for those who trust in Him (Psalm 34:19). This shows that, even in the midst of suffering, God does not abandon His children nor ignore their cry.

Those who suffer persecution for righteousness' sake are blessed, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven (Matthew 5:10). This teaching shows that suffering for doing what is right is not a cause for shame, but a sign of faithfulness and obedience.

Trials should not cause discouragement. Afflictions are part of the walk as children of God and help strengthen faith, teaching us to trust God even when circumstances are difficult (1 Peter 4:12-13). Remaining steadfast in the midst of persecution reflects a heart that loves God and trusts in His promises.

Additional Materials

Living according to the gospel implies obeying God even when this brings rejection. After all, we know that He is pleased with those who remain faithful.

BLESSED ARE YOU, WHEN MEN REVILE YOU**Bible Reading:** 1 Peter 4:4-9**VERSE TO MEMORIZE:**

"Blessed are you, when others revile you, and persecute you, and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account." Matthew 5:11

OBJECTIVE:

INSTRUCTIONAL COMMENTARY

When a person decides to live according to the will of God, his way of life changes. This difference causes others to be surprised and, in many cases, to speak evil of those who no longer participate in the same conduct, for the world is astonished when someone leaves behind his former life to obey God (1 Peter 4:4).

God knows the hearts and judges each person with justice, therefore the reproaches of the world have no greater value than the approval that comes from above. Remaining steadfast in the face of reviling shows conviction and trust in God (1 Peter 4:5).

When people are reviled, persecuted, or pointed out because of the gospel, they are blessed (Matthew 5:11). Hurtful words do not define the value of those who obey God, but rather their faithfulness before Him.

We must respond wisely to offenses. Instead of returning evil for evil, we must maintain conduct guided by love, be temperate, and remember that love covers a multitude of sins (1 Peter 4:8). The example of the Lord Jesus shows us that remaining steadfast in the face of reviling strengthens faith and confirms the conviction to live according to the gospel. Obedience does not depend on the approval of the world, but on a heart determined to please God at all times.

BLESSED IS THE MAN WHOM THE LORD CHASTENS

VERSE TO MEMORIZE:

"Blessed is the man whom you discipline, O LORD, whom you teach of your law." Psalm 94:12

OBJECTIVE:

To recognize that God corrects our walk when we are acting wrongly and that chastening is a demonstration of His love.

INSTRUCTIONAL COMMENTARY

God observes everything that happens and knows the actions of men. Although some think that He neither sees nor hears us, in reality, He does not forsake His people, and His care remains even when He corrects us (Psalm 94:7-10).

The chastening that comes from above is not intended to destroy, but to teach and correct the way. God disciplines man in order to instruct him and guide him along the right path. Thus He shows that His correction is part of His care and His instruction (Psalm 94:12).

Correction produces rest and direction. When God corrects, He prepares the heart to learn and walk according to His will, with the sole purpose that we may avoid paths that lead to error and suffering.

Certainly, recognizing correction is a blessing. Accepting discipline allows us to grow, learn, and remain steadfast on the right path.

BLESSED IS THE MAN WHO DOES NOT WALK IN THE COUNSEL OF THE WICKED

Bible Reading: Job 1:1-8

VERSE TO MEMORIZE:

“Blessed is the man who walks not in the counsel of the wicked, Nor stands in the way of sinners, Nor sits in the seat of the scoffers.” Psalm 1:1

OBJECTIVE:

To understand that the Scriptures classify as “blessed” those who do not give ear to evil counsel.

INSTRUCTIONAL COMMENTARY

Blessedness begins with the decisions that are made each day. Listening to wrong counsel can lead one down unpleasant paths. Therefore, blessed is the one who does not walk in the counsel of the ungodly nor follow paths that lead away from obedience.

Job was a perfect and upright man, one that feared God and eschewed evil (Job 1:1). This description shows that his conduct did not depend on what others thought, but on his reverence and obedience.

Not all counsel leads to good. There are words that appear good, but lead to error when they turn us away from the right path. Guarding the ear and the heart helps one remain steadfast and walk uprightly. Avoiding the counsel of the ungodly protects the heart and conduct, and those who decide to listen and obey learn to discern between what edifies and what harms.

Material:**



True blessedness is not found in following the multitude, but in pleasing God. Listening to His word and rejecting erroneous counsel makes it possible to live a righteous, steadfast, and blessed life.

OBJECTIVE:

INSTRUCTIONAL COMMENTARY

Blessedness is linked to a life ordered according to the commandments. Blessed are those who walk in the law of God and show that obedience guides their steps daily.

Keeping the commandments does not mean merely knowing them, but living them with all the heart, for those who seek God with integrity and obedience strive not to depart from His ways.

Learning the commandments helps to keep the heart from evil. By treasuring the word, one learns to conduct oneself properly and to make good decisions.

True joy is found in obeying the commandments of God. Meditating on His word and putting it into practice strengthens faith and establishes our steps (Psalm 119:15-16).

VERSE TO MEMORIZE:

"Rejoice, and be glad: for your reward is great in heaven: for so they persecuted the prophets who were before us." Matthew 5:12

OBJECTIVE:

To reflect that the race of a child of God is not easy, but it brings great spiritual riches..

INSTRUCTIONAL COMMENTARY

Following God implies effort, perseverance, and faithfulness. The life of the believer is compared to a race that must be run to the end, in order to remain steadfast in the faith.

The apostle Paul expresses that he fought the good fight and finished the course. This shows that life before God requires perseverance and commitment (2 Timothy 4:7).

The effort is not in vain. At the end of the race, God has prepared a reward for those who remain faithful. There is a crown reserved for those who love the appearing of the Lord Jesus, which teaches that God recognizes the faithfulness of His children (2 Timothy 4:8).

Those who suffer difficulties, persecutions, and trials should rejoice and be glad. The reward is not limited to earthly things, but is reserved for those who remain steadfast in His word (Matthew 5:12).

Joy does not depend on everything being easy, but on the hope we possess. Even in the midst of weariness and difficulty, we can rejoice knowing that God observes our effort and has prepared an eternal reward for us. Finishing the race faithfully brings spiritual riches that do not perish. Living in obedience strengthens faith, fills the heart with hope, and establishes confidence in the promises that have been prepared for us.
